Builders drew on the tradition of well-to-do homeownership surrounded by a lush, green lawn and provided blue-collar neighborhoods with lawns of their own. Prior to this time, front yards were dedicated to growing fruits, vegetables and flowers.

Is it even conceivable to revert to the old ways of filling our yards with food and pollinators? Would our busy lives allow us the time to care for our yards this way? For most of us, probably not, so how about a compromise? What if we only applied lawn to the areas we actually used as flat park-like spaces and dedicated the rest of the yard to the garden? It's a conundrum, for sure. But like all things, perhaps it's just about balance - dedicating areas of the yard to the garden and letting the grass grow where we need a place to run.
